Workshop description:

Community based social workers and healthcare practitioners are positioned to improve care and decision making for people with chronic, life limiting and advanced illnesses or those who are dying, encountering these individuals in a broad range of settings including human services and social organizations and agencies. This workshop will present skills and strategies to help individuals and their families/caregivers manage end of life issues and advance care planning.

Many non-medical programs (case management, senior centers, NORC supportive services programs, social adult day care etc.) offer opportunities to directly address the practical concerns and psychological needs related to advanced illness and advance care planning. With information and expertise, caregivers can help build a supportive response to help individuals address end of life decision making, advance care planning and care preferences.

Lori has supervised a team of master level social workers, nurses, nutritionists, spiritual care providers, physical ϑ occupational therapists, and social work students in the delivery of care management, counseling and advocacy. Over the past 25 years she has led the development and implementation of a dietetic internship program, an online graduate nutrition program, a WIC program, the Stony Brook Heights Rooftop Farm, a sports nutrition program with Stony Brook Athletics, and a robust public health nutrition program creating environmental and policy changes to increase access to healthy foods in low-income communities. In addition, she led the integration of the Stony Brook University Hospital Clinical Nutrition team with the academic Nutrition Division. Josephine maintains a clinical practice, including management of chronic illnesses, such as diabetes, heart disease, IBS, SIBO and eating disorders. Josephine also serves as the Chair of the New York State Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics Therapeutic Diet Order Writing Task Force, and President of the Long Island Dietetic Association.
